God first opened my eyes to the cause of the immigrant nearly 25 years ago during a Mennonite Central Committee Learning & Service Trip. As our youth group traveled around Guatemala, I was confronted with the disparities that exist in our world and I felt convicted to live life differently when I returned to Ohio. This sense of conviction has changed my life in many ways, but one specific result was it led to me joining the Open Arms board soon after I graduated from college. Back in the early 2000's Open Arms was a much smaller organization, but the same passion to welcome the immigrants was still the motivating force of the ministry. I enjoyed my tenure as a board member and continued to support and keep in touch with Open Arms after I cycled off the board.

Around 2016, I met Rollin Mukanza for the first time. Rollin had reached out to Ohio Conference Mennonite to see if it could relate to a growing Congolese refugee community in Akron. Ohio Conference

then contacted me to see if I could be the point person for this relationship and Rollin and I have been working together since then. As I got to know Rollin it was clear that God had given him the gifts and the calling to serve the immigrant community of Akron in general and the Congolese refugee community in specific. This was



the same passion and calling that I see in Pablo Delgado and in Raul Tadeo and Haroldo Nunes before him. It seemed like a logical step to inquire of Open Arms if they would be open to empowering Rollin to work as a full time Christian worker to welcome, empower and support the immigrant community in Akron.

I am grateful the Open Arms board decided to say yes to this opportunity and invited me back onto the board. I am excited to see what God has in store in Akron, in Wayne county and wherever God is calling us to welcome the stranger in our midst!

I spent most of last month working with Congolese clients on their refugee immigration status. Most of the clients with outstanding status that they procrastinated on are trying to push for the finish line because of the elections in November. I



received many calls and referrals related to the status change of clients. The majority of organizations and agencies dealing with our immigrant clients are overwhelmed, scheduling immigration appointments presently is a great challenge. Most of our clients have their legal refugee status but regardless of legal status, they remain very anxious.

I also assisted clients with navigation of resources such as

public benefits, and distribution of warm clothes and diapers. I continued to schedule and provide transportation to medical appointments to our clients, as it is always a need.

I also spent part of the last month working with Akron Swahili Mennonite Church



leading in conflict resolution, hope and healing training with church leadership. I involved MCC IVEPER Elvis Otiedo in this training in preparation for his second program term in Akron. Open Arms Akron is planning on working closer with Elvis for youth ministry programs development with the Swahili church

Open Arms Akron participated in the planning of January 26th Combine church service that will take place at Wooster Mennonite church.
